APCPS at a Glance

APCPS was incorporated in 1963 by enactment of '*The Community Planning Profession Act.*'

The goals of the Association are:

- To ensure to the public the proficiency and competence of professional community planners in the practice of professional community planning
- To promote and improve the proficiency and competence of professional community planners in any matter relating to professional community planning
- To do all or any of such things as may promote the usefulness of professional community planners to the public. APCPS is an affiliate of the Canadian Institute of Planners (CIP)

There are four main documents that govern the operation of APCPS:

- *The Community Planning Profession Act*, being Chapter C-21, R.S.S.
- *APCPS Bylaw No. 5* (Operations)
- *APCPS Bylaw No. 2* (Code of Professional Conduct)
- *Affiliate Agreement* between CIP and APCPS

The University of Saskatchewan offers a CIP-recognized undergraduate program called the Regional and Urban Planning (RUP) program. The University of Saskatchewan also administers the examination for those applying for full membership.

In 1993, the Work Study program was introduced to the RUP program offered at the University of Saskatchewan. Employers who may offer work-study positions should contact the Education Chair for further information.

Full members of the Association are encouraged to use the exclusive designation PPS (Professional Planner-Saskatchewan) and MCIP (Member-Canadian Institute of Planners) to identify their membership in the Association and CIP. Seals bearing the Certificate number of the respective member are also available (at cost) from the membership registrar.

Officers Reports

President

My term as APCPS President has been a very rewarding experience. Over the past year there have been many highlights.

At the National level, implementation of the Planning for the Future project continues. The Planning Standards Board (PSB) will be up and running starting in the New Year. New Candidate members will be able to take advantage of the new membership process which includes a mentorship program. Members will be encouraged to become mentors for these new planners. APCPS continues to support other CIP Initiatives such Healthy Communities and Great Places in Canada.

At the Provincial level, changes to the Planning Professions Act will be considered by the Saskatchewan Legislature this fall. These changes include our name change to the Saskatchewan

Professional Planners Institute (SPPI). APCPS Council, in particular Bill Delainey has worked very hard on preparing these changes.

In closing, I would to extend my thanks to Marilyn Steranka and to everyone who I have served on Council with over the past few years. We worked together through the challenges and have celebrated the successes. I wish Karen Bolton the best of luck over the next two years.

President-Elect

What an exciting year this has been with the Planning for the Future (PFF) project reaching a historic and significant milestone; establishing the Professional Standards Committee, with the agreement of all Canadian Institute of Planners (CIP) Affiliate Presidents. The Committee will be responsible to maintain the national professional standard and accreditation requirements for members and educational institutions. Administration of the standards and processing applications for membership and accreditation will now be handled by the Professional Standards Board. The Board is in the process of incorporating and is expected to be able to accept and handle Candidate (Provisional) Membership applications on behalf of the affiliates beginning in fall 2012. Since it began in 2007, Planning for the Future, has involved many affiliate members and CIP staff who have navigated obstacles, addressed challenges and successfully built on opportunities to develop consensus on a national standard – indeed a historic achievement.

These new structures affect CIP's role in member certification and their relationship with Affiliates. In order to move forward with clear purpose and direction, CIP launched a comprehensive effort to develop a new strategic plan that supports the outcomes of PFF and continues to strengthen the profession of planning in Canada. This involved gathering input from members, Council, CIP committees and staff. A strategic planning retreat was held in June 2012 and members can look forward to the release of the new strategic plan for 2012 – 2015 this fall.

At a national level, CIP's the National Affairs Committee is involved in numerous initiatives, including:

- Indigenous Peoples Planning – which focuses on the Aboriginal Youth planning internship program and discussions around an Indigenous Planning Forum;
- Climate Change – continues to seek partnerships with municipal and technical organizations that are responsible for developing and implementing climate change policies and initiatives;
- Healthy Communities - has completed Phase 1 of Healthy Canada by Design. Outputs of this effort include a Healthy Community Practice Guide, research fact sheets for planning professionals, a built environment inventory, a CIP website module, an article for Plan Canada, and a series of webinars.;
- Natural Hazard NRCan Workshops on Disaster Resilience Design; and
- Affiliation with Transportation Association of Canada (TAC), which provides opportunities to participate in meetings, share information and be a part of relevant initiatives.

CIP's Policy Committee has been progressing on developing policy tools related to water and identifying emerging pressures for planning professionals. Opportunities for future efforts will be further defined when the role of CIP in policy matters and advocacy is clarified in the new strategic plan.

Although not a glamorous task, CIP's Governance and Finance Committee's review budgeting and accounting processes and refine relevant procedures to ensure Council operates effectively and efficiently.

I strongly encourage any member to consider the role of President-Elect which brings with it the opportunity to immerse yourself in the business of a national organization committed to advancing the profession of planning across the country.

I am excited to begin my term as President and look forward to connecting with planners in this province to understand how the Association can best support the profession in a time of extraordinary growth.

Planning for the Future

The new membership standards will come into effect in the new year. Any new applicants after the implementation date will apply directly to the Professional Standards Board (PSB) at the national level. Individuals who were provisional members in good standing prior to the implementation date will, at their discretion, be eligible to complete the membership certification process under the new requirements or to complete their certification based on previously existing requirements. APCPS will be required to continue to accommodate those provisional members that choose to follow the previously existing standards up to a maximum of seven years from the implementation date.

Treasurer

The 2011 budget met and exceeded forecasted expectations and resulted in a surplus of \$9,182 for the 2011 year. Net income from the 2011 AGM and conference in Saskatoon, job advertising, and membership applications exceeded forecasted amounts for 2011. Revenue from workshops and programs was significantly lower than forecasted in 2011. Details of expenditures are outlined in the attached 2011 unaudited financial statements.

Revenue streams included:

- \$7,875 from the APCPS job advertisement site;
- \$1,054 from the 2011 annual general meeting and conference;
- \$177 from workshops and programs; and,
- \$1,000 from grants.

The grants were comprised of \$1,000 from the Regional and Urban Planning Program, University of Saskatchewan for the annual (degree recognition) review.

Following the financial policy set at its May 2011 meeting, Council set aside an operating reserve equivalent in amount to approximately one year of operations. For 2011 the operating reserve target was set at \$32,000. The majority of this amount is held in a Guaranteed Investment Certificate (valued at \$30,615.95 on 20 July 2012), with the balance in the APCPS chequing account.

As required on an annual basis:

I recommend that APCPS pass a motion to waive the requirement for a formal audit of 2012 finances.

The unaudited financial statements provided by Marcia Herback CA meet the needs of the Association and provide a financial summary consistent with general accounting practices.

In 2011 the APCPS moved to a budget format where income and expenses for 'operating' and 'programming' are disaggregated. Further to that change, at its May 2012 meeting Council adopted a financial policy that the APCPS programming budget will be set such that its forecasted net income is at least equal to the APCPS forecasted operating deficit for the financial year.

At the 2012 AGM the membership may wish to begin considering where it would like to direct its accumulated financial resources. Over and above the operating reserve, there are thousands of dollars in the APCPS chequing account and an additional Guaranteed Investment Certificate valued at just over \$27,000 which will mature in February 2013. The APCPS may wish to direct some of its financial resources toward new initiatives that will further its goals in Saskatchewan.

A new logo will be needed as well as updates to our current materials including the website. A communications committee will be needed to assist with the re-branding. A call for committee members will go out this fall; all members who are interested in being a part of this task are encouraged to assist with the process.

World Town Planning Day

World Town Planning Day is an opportunity to promote a better understanding and awareness of Canadian Planners and planning to the local community and all levels of government. To celebrate the event, CIP, and the Affiliate Associations (including APCPS) work to create and deliver a poster. Anyone interested in obtaining a poster for display in their planning office should feel free to contact APCPS and one will be ordered on your behalf, free of charge.

Many Canadian planners and municipalities hold their own events on World Town Planning Day to educate and promote the value of planning within their communities. If you are holding an event and would like to share the details of the event, APCPS can help you spread the news.

National Level

At the National level, the Communication Chair is also the APCPS representative on the CIP Communication's Committee. The functions of the Committee vary, but the Committee's main priority is to advise members of the development of communication materials and to market CIP and the profession to domestic and international audiences.

Education Chair

The Education Chair's role and responsibilities include the following:

- 1) Represents APCPS on the University of Saskatchewan Regional and Urban Planning (RUP) Development Program Committee, dealing with issues related to the delivery of the University's RUP Planning Program;
- 2) Encourages student membership in APCPS;

- 3) Co-ordinates the RUP Programs Work Study Program;
- 4) Responsible for the coordination of the accreditation requirements of the RUP Program with the University of Saskatchewan;
- 5) Acts as the judge for the McLeod-Jourdin Memorial and Fraser Gatrell Awards. This award is presented to the RUP student demonstrating skill, knowledge and talent in producing a design project or paper of exceptional value to urban, regional, or community planning. The McLeod-Jourdin Memorial Award is given to the winner in an open competition of eligible entries;
- 6) Co-ordinates the Andy Campbell Award. This is an annual award of \$200.00 and a certificate given to a full-time fourth year student registered in the RUP Program. The student must be eligible for graduation and obtain the highest scholastic standing in the 3rd and 4th year courses as designated by the College of Arts and Science. The recipient must also be a Student Member in standing with APCPS;
- 7) Facilitates opportunities for the Association to enhance their relations with students;
- 8) Responsible for CPL initiative:
 - a. Respond to CPL enquiries;
 - b. Chair the CPL Committee;
 - c. Update the CPL Program Guide;
 - d. Contact non-compliant members to provide assistance and advice on entering Learning Units;
 - e. Propose amendments to CPL Bylaw as required;
 - f. Attend CPL National Committee Meetings'
 - g. Communicate to membership of CPL timelines, updates, etc.; and,
 - h. Review course content and assign Learning Units.

As Education Chair, this past year has been a learning experience with much excitement. Below is a summary and update on the occurrences and fulfilled roles and responsibilities.

Regional and Urban Planning (RUP) Program

Every year the RUP 413.0 Work Study Program is offered to students who are enrolled in the Regional and Urban Planning Program at the University of Saskatchewan. This is a voluntary work placement that gives students hands-on planning experience. In Term 1, there were five (5) students placed within Saskatoon in both the public and private sectors. In term 2, there were a total of fourteen students who applied and six placements available. Nine of fourteen students were able to be placed. At the end of each placement, students are required to submit a summary report about their placement. In addition, students and host employers are asked to submit a feedback form on the program. Some of the feedback included:

- More notice of the program – to begin sooner
- That the work placement be longer than 39 hours
- Explore opportunity to have a summer work placement program

We would like to thank those who hosted students in the program.

This year, the RUP Program underwent an Annual Review. An Annual Review is mandated by the Canadian Institute of Planners (CIP) and was recommended by the Site Visit Committee after the Intensive Review of the RUP Program that was completed in December 2008. A Periodic Intensive Review was completed by a Site Visit Committee in 2011. The purpose of the Annual Review is to ensure the requirement of the Canadian Institute of Planners (CIP) Membership Manual Volume 3 continues to be met. Recognized degree programs are expected to submit a report that briefly addresses the existing Site Visit Committee Report observations, as well as the status of the CIP

accreditation criteria. All of the criteria continues to be met as per CIP standards. Thank you to everyone who participated in the annual review.

Continuous Professional Learning

The Education Chair is responsible for the implementation of the Continuous Professional Learning (CPL) Program and is the affiliate representative on the CIP National CPL Committee. All Provisional and Full Members must participate in the CPL Program to satisfy the requirements of membership. In 2011, APCPS had 170 provisional and full members working towards their professional development and continuous learning. Of the 170 members there were 136 who were able to complete the units required as per the current guidelines. APCPS has initiated a fine to those members who did not participate in the CPL program. Members who continued to not meet the requirements of the program as of June 30 were struck from the registry. In 2011, three non-compliant members were struck from the registry. Saskatchewan has a very high rate of compliance and is seen as a leader in mandatory CPL management.

In January 2012, the National CIP CPL Committee met in Ottawa. All of the provincial affiliates met to discuss Planning for the Future, CPL in each affiliate, CPL guides, the CIP website and entering CPL units online. The group went through an exercise to discuss a wish list of how to improve the website to make entering units online easier and user friendly for members. This was based on feedback from members, examples from elsewhere and technical advice and experience. Finally, a committee was struck of members from the CPL Committee and Membership Committee to review the CPL guides of all affiliates in order to come together to create one consistent guide for all affiliates across Canada.

The past year was eventful with the adoption of a new APCPS Bylaw, the initial implementation of the Canadian Institution of Planners “Planning for the Future” (PFF) recommendations, and preparation of a new Community Planning Professions Act. Changes to the Act were prepared by the Policy Development Branch of the Ministry of Government Relations in consultation with the APCPS Council and input from the membership.

The current Act, initially enacted in 1979, is being redrafted to respond to anticipated changes to membership and accreditation standards resulting from the PFF Project, recent changes in provincial labour mobility standards, and to bring it into compliance with other self-regulating professional legislation in Saskatchewan. Drafting instructions have been prepared and circulated within the Association and have received initial approval from the Legislation and Regulation Review Committee in advance of being presented as a formal Bill at the fall session of Parliament.

This year there are five Council positions available including President Elect. Paula Kotasek has completed her term as APCPS President and Karen Bolton takes over as the leader of the Association. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the outgoing councillors including Paula Kotasek, Doug Daniels, Ryan Walker, and Jennifer Taylor for their dedication and contributions to this Association.

Student Representative

In the 2011-2012 school year there were over 90 students majoring in Regional and Urban Planning (RUP) and approximately 20 graduates of this program at the University of Saskatchewan. This year, five students comprise the executive of the Planning Students Association (PSA), which is responsible for enhancing student involvement and experience in the RUP program at the U of S. The new executive was elected at our AGM in March 2012 and consists of Paulette D'Eon (President), Carolyn Dunn (Vice President), Jonathan Derworiz (Communications Director), Robyn Rechenmacher (Social Director), and myself, Kyle Witiw (APCPS Student Representative). The PSA will be planning social events for the upcoming school year and as part of my mandate, I will be informing the APCPS Executive Council of these events so that members can participate.

This past February, the University of Saskatchewan sent 19 students to the Canadian Association of Planning Students (CAPS) Conference in Vancouver, BC. This put U of S attendance higher than any other planning program outside of the Vancouver area. This was largely thanks to the strong leadership of last year's PSA, including APCPS Student Representative, Ian Goeres and PSA President, Ashley Kostyniuk; both recent graduates of the RUP program. My goals for this academic year are to match or exceed this level of participation for the upcoming CAPS Conference hosted in Montreal, QC from January 31-February 3, 2013 and to exceed the number of student presenters that we send to this conference, compared to CAPS 2012 (two student presenters).

Through Term 2 (January to April 2012), the GEOG 446.3 led by Henry Lau hosted a series of presentations, a charrette, and a design exhibition showcasing their work on conceptual re-designs of the U of S Bus Mall. This proved to be a highly successful and well-received class project that not only generated significant discussion and interest at the U of S, but also in the larger community in Saskatoon. This project even received some local media attention. In May 2012, several students participated in the GEOG 340.3 course and field trip to Prague, Czech Republic with Dr. Avi Akkerman. The two-week course allowed students to observe various architectural styles and street designs in Prague.

The upcoming year promises to be an exciting one for the PSA and for RUP students at large. The PSA was recently ratified as a Campus Group by the University of Saskatchewan Students' Union (USSU). This will open the PSA up to greater awareness and resources, campus wide. The PSA is also hosting a new, easier to find and navigate Facebook Page that will act as a central information point for PSA and RUP related events and initiatives.

Events planned for students this coming year include a Steak Night Fundraiser to raise funds for students to attend the CAPS Conference in Montreal, a Student Spotlight Night to showcase student projects and provide students with experience in presenting their work, a "Speaking with Our City" event that will engage students, community members, professionals and artists in a dialogue about planning their experiences in the City of Saskatoon, and much, much more! An important theme that is emerging from these planned events is conference and presentation experience. This is important moving forward as we hope to build experience and momentum towards a possible bid to host the CAPS Conference at the U of S in 2014 or 2015.

Finally, I want to express appreciation to the APCPS for the funding assistance made available to students who are attending this conference. Conference experience is vital for RUP students in supporting and enhancing their academic and professional careers and APCPS funding assistance directly supports students in this regard.

Fraser–Gatrell Memorial Scholarship

The Fraser–Gatrell Memorial Scholarship has been endowed in memory of two Saskatchewan community planners who were tragically killed in northern Saskatchewan in 1993. The late Tom Fraser was the manager of the Provincial Government’s Northern Community Planning office. The late Darren Gatrell was an excellent student who graduated from the RUD program in 1992 and had began his career in the same office.

The ‘*Fraser–Gatrell Memorial Scholarship Award*’ is intended to be funded for fifteen years, through annual earnings of a trust established by donors to be awarded by the University of Saskatchewan. The value of the Scholarship is estimated at \$1,200, based on University practices regarding trust value preservation.

Selection for the award is based on a completed project or paper dealing with planning or development in Canada, north of the 53rd parallel, on overall achievement of the applicants, and on

their community involvement. Applicants for the scholarship award may include individual students or groups of students, full-time in RUP, who submit an urban design project or research paper on urban, regional or community planning in Northern Canada.

The Selection Committee, comprised of the Dean of the College of Arts and Science, and representatives from the RUP Administrative Committee and APCPS/CIP, determines the winning candidate. All competition entries must be submitted to the RUP Chair in three copies. RUP does not commit itself to grant the award if no deserving submissions are made in a particular year. The deadline for submissions of entries for the Fraser-Gatrell Memorial Scholarship Award is the last working day February of each academic year.
